Wider Curriculum



Provoke challenging questions about the ultimate meaning and purpose of life, beliefs about God, the self and the nature of reality, issues of right and wrong and what it means to be human.

Ability to be reflective about their own beliefs (religious or otherwise) and perspective on life.

Challenges pupils to reflect on, consider, analyse, interpret and evaluate issues of truth, belief, faith and ethics and to communicate their responses.

Ability to recognise the difference between right and wrong and to readily apply this understanding in their own lives. Develops pupils' knowledge and understanding of Christianity, other principal religions, other religious traditions, and other world views that offer answers to these challenging questions.

Knowledge of, and respect for, different people's faiths, feelings and values.

Enables pupils to flourish individually within their communities and as citizens in a diverse society and global community.

They will develop and demonstrate skills and attitudes that will allow them to participate fully in and contribute positively to life in modern Britain. Offer opportunities for personal reflection and spiritual development.

Ability to be reflective about their own beliefs (religious or otherwise) and perspective on life.

Enable pupils to develop respect for and sensitivity to others, in particular those whose faiths and beliefs are different from their own.

Interest in exploring, improving understanding of and showing respect for different faiths and cultural diversity and the extent to which they understand, accept, respect and celebrate diversity. Enhances pupils' awareness and understanding of religions and beliefs, teachings, practices and forms of expression, as well as of the influence of religion on individuals, families, communities and cultures.

Promote sensitivity and enable pupils to combat prejudice.

Ability to recognise, and value, the things we share in common across cultural, religious, ethnic and socio-economic communities. Encourage pupils to learn from different religions, beliefs, values and traditions, while exploring their own beliefs and questions of meaning.

Understanding and appreciation of the range of different cultures in the school, and further afield as an essential element of their preparation for life in modern Britain. Encourage pupils to develop their sense of identity and belonging.
